Morning Prayer (also **Matins** or **Mattins**) is one of the two main Daily Offices in the churches of the Anglican Communion, prescribed in the various editions of the *Book of Common Prayer* and other Anglican liturgical texts such as *A Prayer Book for Australia* (pages 2-15). The usual practice in medieval parish worship was for the congregation to attend the office of Matins, followed by the Latin Mass. After the English Reformations, the usual Sunday service followed a similar pattern - Morning Prayer then Holy Communion (in English). By the nineteenth century Morning Prayer had become the main Sunday morning service on most Sundays in non-sacramental Anglican parishes, with Holy Communion being celebrated (if at all) after Morning or Evening Prayer (typically once a month, on the first Sunday). In the twentieth century, Holy Communion became the main Sunday morning service once or twice per month. With the revival of the Eucharist as the principal Sunday service during the second half of the twentieth century, Morning Prayer is less frequently used, except as part of the daily office. On weekdays we use the Daily Services for each morning and evening of the week from *An Prayer Book for Australia* (pages 381-433).

Opening Prayer

The night has passed, and the day lies open before us; let us pray with one heart and mind.

Silence is kept.

As we rejoice in the gift of this new day, so may the light of your presence, O God, set our hearts on fire with love for you; now and for ever. **Amen.**

The minister continues

Dear friends, the Scriptures urge us to acknowledge our sins, and not to conceal them from God our heavenly Father, but to confess them with a penitent and obedient heart, so that we may be forgiven through his infinite goodness and mercy.

We ought always to admit our sins before God, and especially when we come together to give thanks for the good things we have received at his hands, to offer the praise that is his due, to hear his holy word, and to ask what is necessary for the body as well as the soul.

Therefore let us draw near to the throne of our gracious God, as we pray:

Confession - kneel or sit for prayer

Almighty and most merciful Father, We have strayed from your ways like lost sheep, we have followed too much the devices and desires of our own hearts, we have offended against your holy laws. We have left undone what we ought to have done, and we have done what we ought not to have done. Yet, good Lord, have mercy upon us; restore those who are penitent, according to your promises declared in Jesus Christ our Lord. Grant, most merciful Father, for his sake, that we may live a godly, righteous and sober lives to the glory of your holy name. Amen.

Absolution - is pronounced by the Priest

The God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ has no pleasure in the death of sinners, but would rather they should turn from their wickedness and live. He has given authority to his ministers to declare to his people who repent the forgiveness of sins.

God ₱ pardons all who truly repent and believe his holy Gospel. And so we ask him to grant us true repentance, and his Holy Spirit, that what we do now may please him, and that the rest of our lives may be pure and holy; so that at the last we may come to his eternal joy; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

The responses are said

Open our lips, O Lord; and we shall declare your praise.

O God make speed to save us. O Lord, make haste to help us.

Glory to God; Father Son and Holy Spirit; as in the beginning, so now, and forever. Amen.

Let us praise the Lord. The Lord's name be praised.

Psalm 95 (Venite) - said by alternate verses

First Reading – from the Old Testament

Here ends the first lesson.

The Song of the Church (Te Deum) - read by alternate verses

We praise you, O God: we acclaim you as Lord. All creation worships you: the Father everlasting. To you all angels, all the powers of heaven: the cherubim sing in endless praise: Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might: heaven and earth are full of your glory. The glorious company of the apostles praise you. The noble fellowship of the prophets praise you. The white-robed army of martyrs praise you. Throughout the world, the holy Church acclaims you: Father of majesty unbounded; your true and only Son, worthy of all praise, and the Holy Spirit, advocate and guide. You, Lord Christ, are the King of glory: The eternal Son of the Father. When you took our flesh to set us free: you humbly chose the Virgin's womb. You overcame the sting of death: and opened the kingdom of heaven to all believers.

You are seated at God's right hand in glory: We believe that you will come to be our judge. Come then, Lord, and help your people, bought with the price of your own blood: And bring us with your saints to glory everlasting.

Second Reading – from the New Testament

Here ends the second reading.

The Song of Zechariah (Benedictus) – read by our clergy

Blessed be the Lord, the God of Israel; Who has come to his people and set them free.

The Lord has raised up for us a mighty saviour: born of the house of his servant David.

Through the holy prophets, God promised of old: to save us from our enemies, from the hands of all who hate us,

To show mercy to our forefathers: and to remember his holy covenant.

This was the oath God swore to our father Abraham: to set us free from the hands of our enemies,

Free to worship him without fear; holy and righteous before him, all the days of our life.

And you, child, shalt be called the prophet of the Most High: for you will go before the Lord to prepare his way,

To give his people knowledge of salvation: By the forgiveness of their sins,

In the tender compassion of our God: The dawn from on high shall break upon us,

To shine on those who dwell in darkness, and the shadow of death: and to guide our feet into the way of peace.

Glory to God; Father Son and Holy Spirit; as in the beginning, so now, and forever. Amen.

The Apostles' Creed

Let us stand and say the Apostles' Creed together.

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth. I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord. who was conceived by the Holy Spirit born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose from the dead.; he ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. from there he will come again to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

The prayer of St John Chrysostom

Almighty God, who has given us grace at this time with one accord to make our common supplications to you and has promised that when two or three are gathered together in your name you will grant their requests: fulfill now, O Lord, the desires and petitions of your servants, as may be most expedient for them; granting us in this world knowledge of your truth, and in the world to come life everlasting. **Amen.**
